

What are prepositions of time?

They're words that help indicate a specific time period, such as a date on the calendar, a day of the week or the time in which an event or action takes place

#1: AT





I'm a little busy at the moment.

Preposition of time: AT

AT is used for a precise time: (this includes time, parts of the day (morning, afternoon, evening) specific events/holidays, and when we talk about something that happened to us at a specific age.

FOR EXAMPLE:

- My appointment is at 8 o'clock
- We'll meet in that spot at sunset.
- Jane went home at lunchtime.
- We visit our friends and family at christmas.
- I learned to play the piano at the age of 2.
- I don't have any money at the moment.

#2: IN /





Preposition of time: IN

IN is used to talk about months, years, long periods of time, a time in the future, **seasons**, the time it took you to do something.

FOR EXAMPLE:

- When I met you in summer, to my heartbeat's sound.
- They met in 1998.
- Mammoths were around in the ice age.
- In december you will study less.
- I learned to ride a bike in 5 weeks.
- The bus will be leaving in a few minutes.

Preposition of time: ON

We use on when talking about days and dates.

FOR EXAMPLE:

- I met her on Christmas day (December 25th).
- I do my homework on Tuesdays.
- I'm busy on Sunday.
- I will leave the city on March 8th
